"Our Deepest Fear"

"Our deepest fear is not that we are
inadequate.

Our deepest fear is that we are powerful
beyond measure.

It is our light, not our darkness that most
frightens us.

We ask ourselves, Who am I to be brilliant,
gorgeous, talented, fabulous?

Actually, who are you *not* to be?

You are a child of God.

Your playing small does not serve the world.
There is nothing enlightened about shrinking
so that other people won't feel insecure
around you.

We are all meant to shine, as children do.

This workshop has proven to be a challenge in many ways. Public transportation is ½ a mile away and the commute has proven troublesome at times for many, myself included. The accumulated energy of the students in the room can at times be intense. But the selfless and passionate participation of our Guest Teachers, Reza Salazar & Yaremis Felix, along with our RL volunteers, continue to make this one of our most important workshops to date.

Our Guest Teachers and volunteers have been sharing their art & experiences with the students in order to continue to investigate how we can create more of an ensemble and community when we meet for these sessions. We have shared stories, and sung songs, and challenged the students with choreography. We have also introduced a poem we work with often "Our Deepest Fear" and we will be exploring how these words make an impact on us...it seems the performance aspect of what RL does really connects with these students...all while addressing the multiple bullying issues that appear in the room during the hour...



June 8th, 2012 “Queens Te Quiero Limpio” Clean Up Event:

On Friday June 8th, 2012 students from Pan American International High School (PAIHS) embarked on their 2nd Annual Project Clean Up, entitled “Queens Te Quiero Limpio” with the support of the local community along with

Last year RL shared the film “HOME” with PAIHS and it became a catalyst for action. This year, after participating in our “Responsibility of Community” Workshop and exploring the root causes of trash in the community, as well as and sharing these findings with their



peers, a core group of 11 PAIHS students

and Math Teacher Steve Espallat led their classmates on five different clean-up routes in Elmhurst, Jackson Heights, and Corona. One group painted the pedestrian bridge on 94th street that connects 44th and 45th Avenues. Many students cross this bridge every day and hope that painting it will help to curb the graffiti and trash that ends up there on a regular basis. After finishing the

clean up routes, students regrouped at Park of the Americas at 104th Street and 41st Avenue for lunch and celebration.



“Queens Te Quiero Limpio” Clean Up Event (cont.):

By the time we were all met and ready to begin cleaning the streets, it was about 9:30am. Approx. 150 PAIHS students were joined by ourselves and volunteers from Community Works, the NYPD’s 115th Precinct Jr. Cadets as well as the 110th Precinct Community Affairs Dept., Jessica Taube from Make the Road NY, and of course the PAIHS staff who had been organized by Steve Esplait (including the theater teacher Ms. James...who would like to discuss a RL teaching artist residency at PAIHS for the fall...stay tuned for more on that...)



Superintendent Frank Okeefe from the Dept. of Sanitation provided the tools and many local businesses donated their support through water & food. (C.Town, Associated, All the Right, Flea Market on Corona Ave., and Bambinos Pizza). SD Printing and Design, Inc. provided the t-shirts.



The weather was on our side and it was a sunny and beautiful day. The students varied in their response to the activity from just experiencing it as a social event while others never stopped cleaning. There were 5 different routes around the neighborhood. The route I was on took us directly to the Park of the Americas where we were culminating the event. We encountered some of the community along the way and the response was always one of curiosity mixed with everything from apathy (usually from transients or homeless) to pride (one park mom said these kids should be doing this because it's their park...)



Councilwoman Julissa Ferreras and her wonderful staff met us at the park and spoke to the students. She thanked RL for our part and reminded us all that these are our streets and parks...and she presented RL with a certificate. And as one final thank you to the students for participating, the NY Mets provided students with tickets to a game, which Julissa passed out at the end of the event.

All in all, it was a powerful day to experience, and I am grateful to all who participated.
